Dutch F-16s for Ukraine Arrive in Romania

The Netherlands <u>delivered the first five F-16</u> <u>fighter jets</u> to Fetesti Air Base in Romania, where Ukrainian pilots will train with other pilots from NATO countries. The training is expected to take five to nine months, according to <u>Pentagon spokesperson</u> <u>Brigadier General Pat Ryder</u>. The aircraft provided for the training will remain the property of the Royal Netherlands Air Force.

Entering service with the U.S. Air Force in 1978 during the Cold War, the F-16 is the primary fighter aircraft for many NATO countries. With the Netherlands <u>replacing</u> <u>their aging F-16 fleet with F-35 jets</u>, they have committed to providing their surplus F-16s to Ukraine. The Ukrainian military's request for AMRAAMs (advanced mediumrange air-to-air missiles) to use with the F-16s provided by NATO countries <u>was</u> <u>approved by the Pentagon</u> despite the risk of the highly sensitive technology in those weapons systems being captured by Russian forces in Ukraine.
