## **Houthis Strike U.S.-owned Commercial Ship**

U.S. Central Command (CENTCOM) announced <u>Houthis attacked a U.S.-owned</u> <u>bulk carrier *Gibraltar Eagle*</u> with an antiship cruise missile in the Gulf of Aden today. The ship, flying the Marshall Islands flag, is owned by Stamford, Connecticut, based Eagle Bulk Shipping and was carrying steel products.

CENTCOM attributed the <u>attack to Houthis</u> <u>in a post on X</u>, and stated the strike did not seriously damage the ship: "The ship has reported no injuries or significant damage and is continuing its journey."
